#### THE MIRANDANET FELLOWSHIP

The MirandaNet Fellowship often called the 'Face Book' of international ICT professionals in education, is non-profit making organisation, free to join, established in 1992. There are more than 700 active members in 70 countries. 6,000 educators visit the site daily for case studies. Members are awarded a Fellowship they publish an article about their expertise for other teachers: the range is wide from international ICT policy makers, teachers, advisers, teacher educators, researchers and commercial associates. 

## Raising achievement and aspirations

**Achievement for All** takes a whole school approach to school improvement. It is focused on improving teaching and learning for all children and young people, particularly the 20% of the school population identified as having special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), too many of whom are not achieving as well as their peers relative to their starting points and are leaving education without the skills and qualifications they need to become independent adults. Achievement for All has three strands; Assessment and tracking, engagement with parents and opportunities for wider outcomes. These strands work together to support the improvement in achievement for our SEND children.

"AFA has put SEND back in the classroom" (Headteacher, Bexley).

"Through AFA teachers have a much clearer picture of this group of pupils" (Manchester University evaluation team)

"I feel listened to and really valued in the structured conversations" (Year 5 parent)

"I know exactly what type of support my son is receiving and what his targets are so that I can help him more too" (Year 5 parent)

"My son is now more confident, he interacts better, he is learning more and he feels better about himself. He used to really struggle and was so clingy with me" (Year 1 parent)

"We've seen it as an opportunity of being creative and approaching learning in a creative way that's going to motivate the children to improve their achievement, their self esteem and their academic aspirations as well" (Teacher, Redcar and Cleveland)

The iCatalyst continuing professional development (CPD) programme works within the school context to develop a shared vision, commitment and collaboration with the local community

iCatalyst is an innovative MirandaNet CPD programme that involves the whole workforce in change. Together with the National Director from Achievement for All and academics from the University of Bedford a programme has been developed of MirandaMods and workshops in Birmingham and London for Achievement for All leaders that aims to develop their skills and interests. Working together Achievement for All leaders can develop a shared vision, share commitment and create strategies to reach out to the learner community, parents. The model can be taken up by by single schools, clusters and regions. iCatalyst enables wide innovation underpinned by effective utilization of digital technology. An important aspect of the learning process is to draw on the experience of the participants who are engaging in change. Examples of action research topics are: developing leadership strategies; creating and sustaining learning communities; reassessing assessment; using digital resources for learning; raising assessment in and with digital technologies. Programmes have run in England, Mexico, India, China and South Africa. Single courses can also be run face to face or in a learning platform. The practice-based workforce programmes can be accredited from certificates of Course Participation, Graduate Certificates, Post-Graduate certificates and Diplomas to full M-level qualifications. Opportunities are also available for study at Doctorate level alongside working in school.
