I have been appointed as Project Director of this project. This is a really great opportunity to put some Fellowship ideas into action in the 14 schools in the Docklands.

April 25th Dinner – Thinking on Our Feet

Having worked so hard on research and development into Think.com, on innovative models for teachers ICT professional development, and on the Web Resources for Teachers by Teachers, the MirandaNet team is now focusing on the best ways to communicate our knowledge to teachers, teachers educators and the wider community.

I bribed the MirandaNet Advisory Council to evaluate our first group presentation with a supper at the Royal Overseas League in Mayfair on the 25th April. Jane Dorner worked on a theme of

'hummmming' that pulled together the thread of the projects that Jane Field, Anne Sparrowhawk, and Francis Howlett have been managing. Jane referred to the five Ms of MirandaNet as Mission, Motivation, Milestones, Making connections and Meeting points. She then up-ended the Ms to create a W for the Website which she has made such a valuable focus for all our work.

I'd like to pay a tribute to the talented core team for the quality of their work. Their commitment is greatly appreciated. In the context of the DfEE Web Resources for Teachers by Teachers project a special thanks to Tanya Keable who is currently celebrated for making sure that we produced quality work for the DfEE and met all our tight deadlines. Not many people can manage a bunch of educators with calm, good humour as she does. Francis Howlett also managed to populate the site with 1,000 plus resources as a result of spectacular organisation and attention to detail. Anne Sparrowhawk provided the template for evaluation, Jane Field developed the e-mentoring service, Jane Dorner wrote on copyright and edited the final report. So confident in them was I that I kept my appointments in Florida and Washington...

Our presentation was well attended by industry, government departments and agencies, and MirandaNet Fellows. Many thanks to those of you who made the time for this. The presentation outlined our work to date and a number of new initiatives. The feedback was very useful and one main point was to add more work from all of you in the Fellowship so that teachers can see what you are actually doing in the classroom.

If you have some good stories and pictures about your work in the classroom, especially Think.com, please let me know. Video clips and pictures will help to create a rich knowledge base that we can all draw on when we are asked to present.

We are now going to share our knowledge with the Ultralab team and build up some good case study examples. Oracle UK is supporting this development and OracleUS are creating a cyber overview of Think.com and a self-study pack to support their training visits. We are also planning a range of helpful publications to follow How to Think.com.

Prague

I now have the 22nd Prague stamp in my passport. Yes, I do know how lucky I am. I never tire of Prague, no matter what the weather - although this time it was sunny and warm as well.

I had been invited to present the MirandaNet work to the Ministry of Education as one of their advisers on the new Information Society programme. As a result the British Council is supporting a bigger seminar called Thinking Together organised by MirandaNet on the 15th June when I have invited several of our colleagues to share developments in the UK.

The seminar will focus on the Czech State Information Policy in Education which is being launched under three programme headings:

Teacher education Education and information resources Technological Infrastructure

Speakers will encourage reflection and discussion about these topics from the perspective of existing Anglo-Czech co-operation in the field. Presentations and workshops will include :

Strategies for global teaching and learning. Professor Niki Davis, Iowa University and the Institute of Education, University of London

The UK Perspective on Education Resource Development - The National Grid for Learning Doug Brown, Director of the UK National Grid for Learning, Department for Education and Employment.

Creating curriculum exchange projects online : Anglo Czech Achievements Bozena Mannova, Chair of the Czech Miranda, Czech Technical University

Developing Anglo Czech Professional Development Opportunities Christina Preston, Director of MirandaNet International, the Institute of Education, University of London

Developing Resources Together : Industry Education Partnership Managing Director of Oracle, Czech Republic

Making the most of ICT funding opportunities for ICT research and development Jack Pfeffer, European Development Officer, the Institute of Education, University of London

Participants will be invited to join workshops to discuss ideas, find UK partners and develop funding bids. These are all names you know.

Teachers' International Professional Development Bursaries

Building on these links, the Czech Miranda will be hosting a school exchange visit in the October half term. We shall be publishing detailed explanations of how to join these projects and get your funding soon. Keep an eye on the deadlines.

We have also applied to the EU Minerva project for an exchange project that includes the Czech Republic and Bulgaria.

Schools in Canada, US, Bulgaria and the Czech Republic are particularly keen to receive visits from MirandaNet Fellows. You need four from one school or nine from an LEA. MirandaNet will help you apply for these grants.

Teachers Action Research Bursaries

The DfEE is once again offering up to £2,500 to teachers who want to develop an action research project in the classroom. MirandaNet Fellows won more than £30,000 of grants last year. John Cuthell and Anne Sparrowhawk have some experience of how to apply. If you are interested email me about this. However the closing date is 31^{st} May. I am also aware how exhausted some teachers are feeling just now and hesitate to press this idea.

Web Resources for Teachers by Teachers WEBRITTe Project

The pre-pilot phase of the WEBRITTE project has come to an end culminating in an excellent report based on the project findings and recommendations. This report can be viewed on the MirandaNet website later on this month. I would like to thank everyone who worked so hard on this project and congratulate the whole team on reviewing over 1500 resources which are now up on the TeacherNet site. We also did a small piece of research on the Teacher Resource Exchange, the outcomes of which will lead to improvements in the site. This report will also be available on the website soon. We hope that MirandaNet will be able to be involved in the next phase of this exciting work with the DfEE and are awaiting further news re the tendering process. We will keep you informed of developments on this one.

What impressed me so much was the opportunity they had seen to use this technology to increase democratic participation after Pinochet. Also the strategies they use to engage indigenous groups like the Mapuche in the education process.

Enrique who did his doctorate at the Institute of Education, University of London, where MirandaNet is based, has just been promoted to Deputy Co-ordinator of Enlaces, appointed by the Minister. What is really exciting for us is that the Enlaces team have been chosen by Oracle to do the first translation of Think.com into Spanish ... where next?
